NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

Too many people die without dignity, or live with chronic and long-term conditions unrelieved by holistic palliative care which brings dignity and relief. EMMS International specialises in developing high quality holistic palliative care services in resource-poor settings.

Our significant experience has strengthened palliative care services in Malawi, Nepal, India, Zambia, Scotland and soon Rwanda. Our funding determines the extent to which these services can be enhanced. Thanks to UK Government grants, we have delivered extensive threeyear programmes with our partners in Malawi and Nepal.

In rural parts of resource-poor countries, where healthcare is inaccessible, cancer diagnoses are often made late or not at all, making each case devastating. The cost of travelling for tests and often futile treatment can result in crippling debt for families.

EMMS International has worked with our partners to develop specialist services, improve access to essential medicines, especially appropriate pain management, establish degree-level training programmes, develop palliative care in hard-to-reach places, and collaborate with governments to ensure palliative care is recognised as a healthcare priority.

The quality and effectiveness of this work have been recognized by the UK government, which is currently funding its third partnership with EMMS International to improve palliative care.

We welcome conversations about developing care services for those challenged by poverty and how you can become a catalyst for change.

HEALTH EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Global crises, whether caused by pandemics, the climate emergency or conflict, disproportionately affect communities challenged by poverty. Limited access to healthcare, poor nutrition, educational inequalities and unsafe living conditions leave individuals and families at grave risk.

When extreme weather events, natural disasters or disease outbreaks occur, EMMS International is well-positioned to respond, thanks to our extensive network of in-country partners.

Addressing these disparities requires targeted interventions and policies that focus on building resilience, improving infrastructure, and ensuring equitable access to resources and support systems for the most vulnerable. When disaster strikes, EMMS International moves quickly to provide help where it's most needed.

In recent years, EMMS has responded to:

- Cyclone Freddy and the Worst Recorded Cholera Outbreak in Malawi: We installed, repaired or improved water, hygiene and sanitation systems.
- Two Powerful Earthquakes in Nepal: EMMS supported marginalised communities displaced and left without necessities or healthcare.
- The COVID-19 Pandemic in India and Malawi: EMMS provided oxygen cylinders and PPE where supplies were insufficient.

Experience tells us that health emergencies occur almost annually. Being prepared, maintaining systems and relationships with overseas partners, and the agility and expertise of the EMMS International team ensure that our emergency assistance is both accountable and costeffective.

SUSTAINABLE HEALTHCARE

EMMS International and its partners are committed to improving the quality, accessibility, sustainability and environmental impact of healthcare facilities and infrastructure.

So far, we've installed solar power in four large partner hospitals in Malawi and India. Each hospital faced unique challenges, but together we found solutions for clean energy, reliable power supplies and reduced energy bills. By broadening our scope and sharing knowledge with other NGOs and agencies, we're making a lasting difference.

For example:

- Kachhwa Hospital, Uttar Pradesh, India: With EMMS International's help, the hospital installed an off-grid solar power plant, eliminating the worry of long power outages. Now, the hospital is working towards installing solar streetlamps around its campus.
- Jiwan Jyoti Hospital, Uttar Pradesh, India: Our most recent programme to install solar power with our partners is estimated to cut yearly grid electricity use by 75%, reducing environmental impact and saving on energy costs.
- Mulanje Mission Hospital, Malawi: With EMMS International's support, the hospital renovated its solar power system, integrating grid electricity, solar-generated electricity and battery backup. The hospital's electricity bills have been reduced by 61%, allowing staff to focus on patient care with reliable power.

GLOBAL HEALTHCARE WORKFORCE

The global healthcare crisis demands bold and urgent action. EMMS International programmes aim to develop the healthcare workforce in India, Malawi, Nepal and Zambia, reaching resource-poor communities to empower vulnerable women and girls while supporting a sustainable workforce solution for local health facilities. For example:

- Healthcare Career Pathways: By 2028, EMMS International aims to boost and develop the healthcare workforce across Malawi, Nepal and India by providing access to the pathway to 300 potential healthcare professionals. Learning from operating small-scale scholarship schemes has shown EMMS that scholarship access alone is not always enough. Young girls can be forced to marry as young as twelve. With poor healthcare already a reality, pregnancy and childbirth expose them to unnecessary risk when quality maternity care isn't available. Females are also often forced to leave work and education to care for relatives, meaning their and their families' poverty becomes further entrenched. EMMS has developed the Healthcare Career Pathways to increase successful outcomes for the most disenfranchised women and girls. The process identifies barriers - in educational attainment, gender inequality, cultural practices, economic disparities - and seeks to overcome these by providing a range of supportive measures to encourage vulnerable women and girls to continue in further education. This can include access to English language training, course fees, and essentials such as books, learning tools, accommodation and food, throughout their studies. We have even added our first PhD student to Healthcare Career Pathways, in Zambia.
- College of Nursing and Halls of Residence, The Duncan Hospital, Bihar: Construction of a new College of Nursing and Halls of Residence to train the next generation of healthcare workers and increase income generation for The Duncan Hospital.

THE DUNCAN AND BEYOND: INSPIRING FUTURES

Nearly a century ago, The Duncan Hospital was established in the underserved community of Raxaul, Bihar, by visionary Scottish surgeon Dr. Cecil Duncan. Since then, the hospital has been a beacon of hope and healing, transforming lives in one of India's most resource-poor regions. Today, in partnership with EMMS International, the hospital is embarking on a bold new chapter: The Duncan Centenary Vision, a multi-phase initiative to drive financial, economic and healthcare sustainability.

Phase One of this £4M transformative programme is already underway and fully funded, with the construction of a new College of Nursing and Halls of Residence, installation of solar power, and the creation of healthcare career pathways for thirty two local women and girls. Scheduled for completion in 2026, these facilities will help train and retain future generations of healthcare professionals, ensuring a strong and skilled workforce to serve local communities for years to come.

But we're not stopping there.

Phase Two, Duncan Futures and Beyond, takes this vision even further. By extending our support to additional hospitals, we're creating skilled employment opportunities in healthcare for local communities and empowering vulnerable women and girls to achieve economic independence. At The Duncan Hospital itself, we're further enhancing its infrastructure to provide an inspiring place for staff to work and patients to receive care.

Inspiring Futures is a £3.4 million investment that aims to revolutionise healthcare delivery. This ambitious programme will include the construction of a state-of-the-art Outpatient Department and a Museum at The Duncan Hospital—serving as a tribute to its legacy and a symbol of its future. Simultaneously, we're identifying, mentoring, and supporting academically talented but vulnerable women and girls in an additional eight communities across other states, nurturing the next generation of female health professionals who will inspire change in their own right.

Together, we are not only building a brighter future for The Duncan Hospital but also lighting the way for sustainable development and empowered communities across resource-poor states in India.

CREATING A HEALTHCARE CAREER PATHWAY

The EMMS International Healthcare Career Pathway is an innovative project aimed at addressing the acute shortage of health workers in Malawi, India and Nepal. This programme focuses on developing the healthcare workforce across various professions, from auxiliary nurses and lab technicians to doctors and senior leaders.

Unlike traditional scholarship schemes, the Healthcare Career Pathway addresses barriers to education by providing comprehensive support, including pre-course tuition, mentorship and a guaranteed job at the end. It ensures that marginalised girls not only embark on and complete their studies but also have guaranteed employment through our partner hospital which is closest to their home.

NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

In resource-poor countries, where healthcare is inaccessible, diagnoses of non-communicable diseases, such as cancer, are often made late or not at all, making each case devastating. The cost of travelling for tests and often futile treatment can add up to a crippling debt for families. EMMS International has established itself as an expert in palliative care. It has seen specialist services developed, improved access to essential medicines, established degree-level training programmes and worked with governments to ensure palliative care is a recognised healthcare priority.

NEPAL

EMMS International's UK Aid Match 'Sunita' programme has trained 797 health staff, 6,540 community members and 409 Female Community Health Volunteers to care for patients who are living with a non-communicable disease. This means that patients' children aren't forced to miss school and families aren't pushed further into poverty. The costs for the Green Pastures Hospital Palliative Care Services are as follows:

MALAWI AND RWANDA

Our Non-Communicable Disease Programme in Malawi and Rwanda focuses on the improved quality of life of patients, their families and carers, who face physical, psychological, social or spiritual challenges associated with life-limiting illness.

In Malawi we will expand access to palliative care to 3,846 patients in six districts in Northern and Central Regions. To achieve this, we will train 32 nurses and clinicians, provide mentoring and supervision to them and 24 previously trained staff, and orientate 320 healthcare workers from 16 aovernment health facilities.

In **Rwanda** we will expand access to palliative care to 361 patients, of which 61 patients will be children. We will train 488 nurses, clinicians and healthcare workers across 86 healthcare institutions and 52 community-level healthcare workers in Kicukiro, Gasabo and Nyarugenge districts (Kigali Capital Province) and Gicumbi district (Northern Province.)
